# Pastor Katy's Reflections

It is a wonderful time of year to be in ministry. And, THIS is a wonderful PLACE to be in ministry.

This month, a church member gave me her cozy and long winter coat. Because she had two, and my winter coat broke.

Folwell elementary school is connected to Christ UMC through the Food 4 Friends program (we pack Channel One food bags to help support families who need a little extra, every week) and sometimes they reach out to us for other needs the kids have. I put out a call on Facebook for size 10 women's boots, and within just a few hours a church member contacted me with a pair to spare.

Fifteen teenagers celebrated "White Elephant" Christmas parties with us leaders, where a "Grinch" adult-sized onesie was the most popular and fought-over item, and the kids shared ideas about how else they want to be involved in 2019: they want to help teach adults in our church more about technology, because they have much wisdom to share. And, they want to help learn how to support people who struggle with depression and suicidal thoughts. Amazing.

We sent off fourteen gift bags for college-aged young adults who needed a little encouragement with finals: I got multiple texts back of relief and thanksgiving from the kids, feeling so cared for by this church.

We had over a dozen children from toddlers through 6<sup>th</sup> grade involved in our Christmas pageant this year, called "Rooty's Christmas Wish." They were so proud of their work and were impressively committed: through two worship services and an hour break in between, I saw no tears, heard no complaining, and saw only positivity and excitement.

Plus, we have 18 kids and adults who will be spending New Years Eve reflecting on the year and having fun together at the Ironwood Springs Christian Ranch retreat.

Think we could cram any more into December?

It has been busy, but meaningful and powerful. We do not waste time around here, and we do not rush or do things just for the sake of filling our lives. One of my favorite moments this month, for example, was lingering over dinner with Christ UMC moms and grandmoms, multiple generations together united over the universal language of talking about hair and dresses.

Thank you for the ways you love one another: even in such little things such as lending clothes, bringing fruit to a party, making a card, opening a door, you are being the presence and light of Christ to this world. It is changing this church, and building up our children and youth's lives.



### Sanctuary Church News

The latest development from the Sanctuary Church Movement in Rochester is the establishment of a much needed Immigrant Legal Defense Fund. CUMC is a member of the Interfaith Immigrant Rights Coalition (RIIFC) along with many other churches. All are cooperating with the Diversity Counsel to establish this fund to be used at immigration proceedings.

The fund is needed for those at risk of deportation to have legal counsel when appearing in court. When low income individuals lack access to counsel, a fair hearing does not occur.

Consequences can be harsh such as imprisonment and deportation. The government is represented by counsel, but unlike our citizen judicial system, no legal representation is provided by the US immigration hearing system.

The RIIFC anticipates raising \$50,000 initially for the fund by several means. Donations will be sought from individuals, community organizations and faith communities Olmsted County funding and a Vera grant will be pursued for matching funds to reach a total goal of \$150,000.

Members interested in supporting the fund can do so through CUMC by indicating that the donation is for the Immigrant Legal Defense Fund.

Family Resource center will be hosting each family night which will include a meal and a speaker or activity that pertains to parenting, family projects, child

development, discipline and a number of other topics. Our #1 priority will continue to be promoting the Thrive family as a place of positive connections and caring. None of this is possible without the steadfast support of you, the CUMC congregation.

1) We watched in horror as the Volcano Fuego erupted on June 3rd and buried entire villages in a matter of minutes.





- 2) We've had a bird's eye view of the immigration crisis and how it looks from this part of the world.
- 3) We watched two of our young Guatemalan friends graduate this year and seeing the pride and accomplishment in their faces is bittersweet with the knowledge that even with their level of education their struggle to find steady work will continue.





- 4) John and I have both had health issues that took us by surprise, while these issues have since become manageable, we realized once again how quickly life can change.
- 5) Salud y Paz mourned the loss of a short-term team member who came to Guatemala to do what he loved in serving the rural Guatemalans in Cunen.

What I've learned from much of this is the power of resilience in the Guatemalan culture. It has been an eventful year with moments that have wrenched our hearts in many ways. God is showing us how to become more resilient as well.

Global Ministries has once again approved our ministry with Salud y Paz for 2019. We are grateful, and we are grateful that the CUMC Foundation has also agreed to help us continue in our mission. 
