

These include replacing light bulbs with LED bulbs, painting in meeting rooms and the office, replacing parking chocks and perhaps the most time consuming, mowing the lawn. Thanks to long time lawn mower John Grabau, Chris Mueller, David Lucas and new volunteer Derek Rosin, we were able to keep the lawn presentable as well as pick up apples from the boulevard trees and pick-up leaves.

The Gardening Ministry Team worked hard making our landscaping more beautiful around the wall and where several dead or dying trees were removed by the church. We also worked with the Garden Ministry team to coordinate efforts and with a group wishing to establish a garden to serve Saturday Noon Meals, Thrive and a community food bank.

Volunteers are always needed and appreciated to help with projects. You may help with small projects or larger ones such as lawn mowing. Many hands make light work.

Leadership Team Openings

There will be openings on the Leadership Team of Christ United Methodist Church this coming year. Several of our current members are stepping down, creating an opportunity for others to apply for the vacant seats. A Path Forward

Since its inception in 1999, homeless families in the greater Rochester area have been the focus for Interfaith Hospitality Network, now named *Family Promise*. Our congregation has been part of this ministry since its beginning in Rochester. For many years we hosted families a week at a time in our classrooms and a dedicated group of CUMC volunteers have given great service over many years. Now, big changes are taking place!

As of January, 2021, churches will no longer be hosting guests. A "Static Site" at 913 1st St. NW Rochester will be developed where guests can stay for the weeks they are housed and volunteers will serve. At this site which in there will be a home-like atmosphere and up to four families a night may be housed.

The staff office will be at this site as well. By not rotating hosting sites, services can be more consistent and the goal of helping families transfer from homelessness to safe, affordable housing, employment, schooling and medical care through the on-site social worker and connecting with other service agencies in the community will be given even more attention.

More than 20 million dollars is raised each year to nurture, encourage and train women to make this a better world whether in Africa, South America, India or the United States.



One of the commitments of this statement is to provide training to every Minnesota UMC clergy under appointment in anti-racism. Pastors Elizabeth and Nancy have been selected to take part in the pilot program to give feedback on the content and design. This will be taking place in January and February. Please pray for us as we begin this important program.

Mission Social Justice Overview

Saturday Noon Meals – They have served over 2,300 meals in 4 locations since the first stay at home orders in MN. They continue to feed those who need a healthy meal on Saturdays and work with the City of Rochester, Olmsted County and the Landing MN. Only one household is able to prepare meals each week, and they are always seeking new volunteers! Contact Kathy Lombardo for more information.



Inquiring Spirits – They meet online to discuss their faith journeys through exploration and doubt. All are welcome. Sundays at 11am

RIIRC/SMIILD – Continues to partner with the Diversity Council and NAACP to provide legal counsel for residents of SE Minnesota in ICE detention. They will host a third Sunday forum in January. Contact Marita Heller to get involved.



Appalachia Service Project – They are planning a high school mission for Summer 2021, but it will likely take place locally in order to keep volunteers safe.



Hopeful Earth – They continue to do activism in MN around the environment. They will offer a Third Sunday Forum in February and have converted the lights at the church to eco-friendly LEDs.

Garden Ministry - In 2020, they planted a pollinator garden and a rain garden. They hope to put in a vegetable garden next spring.

Thrift on Fifth - Thrift store. Could barely keep up a year ago. Pandemic has made it hard to work, but they held several sidewalk sales outside of the church which were very productive. Raise money for Thrive.



Business was booming before the pandemic. Since March, we've held sidewalk sales (weather permitting) to move clothing and raise money for Thrive.

The International Missions Team – No longer partnered with Salud y Pas of Guatemala, they still have thousands of pairs of eyeglasses in storage and hope to find a new mission location soon. They need new volunteers to help coordinate and attend future trips.

Three Rivers Restorative Justice



Respect · Accountability · Healing

Three Rivers Restorative Justice – The nonprofit is officially up and running. Volunteers have been trained on Restorative Justice. TRJJ has offices at the church and continues to make new connections in the community. They have trained 25 corrections officers and are taking cases in Southeast Minnesota.

Racial Justice Committee – We will be offering a series of Zoom discussions using *America's Unholy Ghost: The Racist Roots of Our Faith and Politics* in February and March. There will be guest speakers from the church & community. Sign up on the Faith—Life page on the website.

Family Resource Center – Thrive has 52 children now and has continued to operate through the pandemic. The FRC sends home the monthly meal in a bag and has helped to offer support to many families including \$100,000 worth of scholarships since opening in 2018. They are seeking new volunteers!



Saturday Noon Meals Ministry Update

The SNMs program continues to serve a Saturday noon meal for those with food insecurity within the Rochester community. On December 5, 2020 we began serving our meal to the Rochester Civic Center. The Landing was temporarily closed secondary to increased COVID-19 infections at that site. We will return to serving the Saturday noon meal at The Landing when it reopens.





We have served over 2,400 meals since March 2020 and look forward to continuing this mission. In November we made the decision to limit volunteers working within the kitchen to those living in one household. This was done to reduce the potential spread of COVID-19 to our volunteers. We anticipate that these limitations will change within the next several months, but would appreciate additional volunteers at this time to assist with the meal preparation and delivery of the meal to the Rochester Civic Center or The Landing.
