

Pastor's Pen with Pastor Kirkland



In this era of half-truths and (applying a presumption of grace) misunderstandings, there's some commonly held attributions about John Wesley that need cleaning up.

First, the concept of the Wesleyan Quadrilateral: Wesley himself did not fashion this theological framework for interpreting scripture in light of our traditions, reason, and experience.

Wesley was a preacher more than he was a theologian. Now that's not to say he did't possess and insightful theological mind. Rather, Wesley focused his leadership on communicating hope and encouraging what he called "practical divinity," in other words, how to live as disciples.

It was in the mid-20th century, more than two centuries after Wesley lived, that Methodist scholar and theologian Rev. Dr. Albert Outlier developed the quadrilateral framework that informs the Methodist life.

So no, Wesley did not coin the Wesleyan Quadrilateral. And to be honest, I am relieved knowing that Wesley didn't actually name something after himself.

Then there is this quote also attributed to Wesley: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can."

John Wesley did not say this.

Here's what Dr. Kevin Watson, seminary professor and Methodist historian wants us to know about this quote: "You may have seen this quote in a nice frame on the wall of a Methodist Church, or even published in a book, citing John Wesley as its author. (For example, it was cited in Bartlett's Familiar Quotations.) Despite the persistence of the quote being attributed to John Wesley, you will not find in anywhere in his writing."

When I first learned about this misattribution, well, I confess I was more than a little bummed. I'm a Methodist preacher, after all, so it's safe to assume I'm a fan and frequent quoter of Wesley. The last thing I want to do is spread half-truths, especially in a sermon or Bible study.

So what are we to do? The good news is it's still possible to "do good" and follow the spirit of this quote even if we need to unlearn attributing it to Wesley. In this instance, doing good includes holding our minds open for information we do not yet possess, being humble enough to revisit past thinking, and remembering to stay focused on Christ's love at work in us. Doing good is not simply getting things right; doing good is making a difference and growing along the way.

And for the record, I'm keeping in my office the framed "do all the good..." quote that misattributes Wesley. It's still a good reminder to do good...and stay humble.

Youth Group, Confirmation and Club 6/7

Our ministries with 6-12th graders are off to a great start. With the Progressions bell group, some of our youth are being challenged by more difficult handbell music. Club 6/7 has welcomed a few new members as 6thgraders joined our fellowship. This year Club 6/7 will focus on storytelling and being able to tell the big story of the Bible in 50 words. We meet on Wednesdays from 6:30-7:30 pm.

Youth group serves as a place for youth to build a community within the church. Some days are more games oriented, others more focused on ethics or faith or justice issues-- each night is different! One recent youth group gathering featured back in time trivia, may pole dancing and a debate over if the Bible should be in the language of the people and accessible to everyone. While this debate seems out of place today, the invention of the printing press and translation of the Bible into English and German during the Renaissance made this a BIG topic within the church.

Ministries for Children, Sunday School and Kids with Purpose

Our ministries to preschool and elementary children have grown this fall to include Sunday School and a Little Angels choir! We are really excited to offer Sunday School during both the 9:00 and 11:00 worship service. Miss Jody and her volunteer team help children learn a Bible story, play a game to reinforce the story and then make a craft each week. She also helps 4th and 5th graders learn leadership skills as "helpers" to the younger students.



Mayo Hospital Visitor Policy and Pastoral Visits: patients at St Marys Campus and Rochester Methodist Campus may request a pastoral visitor as one of their five visitors during their stay in the hospital. It needs to be approved by their health Care Team. It needs to be the same five visitors during their entire stay. You can't take one off and add a different one. If you want one of the Pastors or Care Visitors to visit, please call the church office (or have another person call) to find out which one of us is available. We will then call the nursing station where the patient is located and it will be reviewed.

Olmsted Medical Center Visitor Policy: please call the church office to let us know if you want us to visit.

Make a Difference Witness: CUMC's Van Ministry - by Randy Petersen

One personal reminder from the COVID pandemic is how comforting the simple act of Sunday morning worship is.

After months of being forced to stay home, it was comforting to meet again, even if it was only in the parking lot. It was comforting to see familiar faces, even if they were obscured by masks. It was comforting to be able to see each other, even if it was from 6 feet away. Church is a place of comfort, but that doesn't mean there's not occasional discomfort connected to faith and service.

I ran headlong into that a little more than a year ago, when a pair of van drivers announced they had moved and the church was desperately in need of new drivers. My first response was "maybe I could do that," which quickly gave way to "that's not for me" before I had a chance to act.

Driving large vehicles is something I've frequently shied away from, letting others take the wheel as I comfortably went along for the ride. Then, Pastor Nancy reached out. I had a "no" readied, but still felt a nudge. Why not try it?

So, I rode along one Sunday, which helped aleve most worries, and showed me why the service is important. I met people – fellow church-goers – who could find Sunday morning comfort in church if I simply overcame my discomfort.

But, more help is needed.

A rider once asked if we'd stop the service if the number of riders declined. I doubt that would happen, but I see the other side as a realistic concern. What would happen if no one was able to be behind the wheel on a given Sunday, due to work or family commitment or illness.

Our handful of volunteer drivers can struggle to make sure someone is available every Sunday, and it's a concern that gives me discomfort.

I know the importance of getting to church, and I've seen the challenges faced by family and friends when transportation becomes an issue. That's why the Christ United Methodist Church van ministry is so important and needs more people to consider stepping outside their comfort zones to ensure others can be delivered to the comfort we all share each Sunday.

Welcoming Samantha Moccia, CUMC's New Director of Communications



Why should I get vaccinated?

Influenza is a serious disease that can lead to hospitalization and sometimes even death. An annual flu vaccine is the best way to reduce the chances that you will get the flu and lessen the chance that you will spread it to others.

Who should get vaccinated?

Although everyone who is at least 6 months of age should get a flu vaccination, at this clinic Hy-Vee is offering the vaccine to those over the age of 3 years.

Which vaccine is offered?

Hy-Vee is offering a quadrivalent injectable vaccine (ages 3 and over). The FluMist intranasal vaccine, if available, (ages 3-49), and a high-dose quadrivalent injectable vaccine recommended for those over the age of 65, if available.

Vaccine is FREE of charge for Medicare patients and is fully covered by most insurances.
