Advent is an under-sung season.

Every year worship leaders and followers of the Jesus story are tempted to rush past one of the best soul gifts we are given: the season of Advent.

Advent is a season of waiting. Advent invites us to mindfully consider what it is we long for.

During Advent we allow our hearts to feel and join into the centuries-long ache for peace and Godly leadership. We hear words about swords beaten into plowshares and wolves lying down with lambs and we want this. We want peace so very deeply. Come, Lord Jesus! Come!

So here at church, we hold off on singing Christmas carols. It is a spiritual discipline. It doesn't earn a pastor tons of accolades to stay in the Advent musical lane, especially when Christmas carols have been jingle-jangling in stores from Halloween on. All around us the secular world is singing the songs of Christmas. Why can't we sing them at church, of all places?

We sing the songs of Advent because they call us to wait. To ache. To prepare our hearts. We sing in a minor key because while the Hope of the World was born to us thousands of years ago, we have yet to fully live into His vision.

This Advent season I pray for you a time of breathing and spaces soaked in silence.

Turn off your television, put down your phone, plug in the Christmas tree and pray the visual sort of rosary that the ornaments on it represent.

Let yourself be a person who feels longing. It sometimes hurts to want so much.

And, in the longing is a message sung by the angels: Peace is promised, peace will be.

To aid us all - me perhaps most especially - to center in this season of Advent, we will be sending out a daily Advent reflection. Be sure you are on our church email list. If you want a paper copy, please let use know.

As we lean into the power of the Sound of Silence, may we each listen for what it is God is singing into our hearts.

For unto us hope is given, again and again. Sometimes that hope needs a goodly dose of silence to bring it to birth.

It will be run by Catholic Charities of Southern Minnesota and will be staffed during open hours. They are currently looking for community partners who can provide volunteers approximately twice a month. Volunteer shifts take place overnight between 8pm and 8am. The hours may be unappealing, but the need is great.

Immigration Support Update

Progress has been made in Southeastern Minnesota to provide legal services to persons in ICE detention who live and work in our area who can't afford a private attorney. Southeastern Minnesota Interfaith Immigrant Legal Defense (SMIILD), a nonprofit organization under the fiscal sponsorship of the Diversity Council, has entered into a contract with Immigration Law Services of Minnesota and Advocates for Human Rights as of October 1, 2019. The most recent data shows that 97 Olmsted County residents have pending immigration proceedings and 39 are not represented by an attorney. A recent study of immigration cases in New York found that being represented by an attorney improved the chances of avoiding deportation by six times.

From January 1 through August 31, SMIILD has raised \$46,500. This amount does not meet all the need, but enables a good start. CUMC has been instrumental in supporting this defense fund. Members have contributed \$5,892.26 or more than 12.6% of the total funds raised.

The treatment of immigrants is a moral and religious issue. Treating a foreigner justly is a basic part of our religious and cultural traditions. Donations can be made to this fund through CUMC with a notation on the check for Immigrant Legal Defense.

On November 2nd, over 100 people gathered in Wesley Hall to celebrate a very successful first year of Thrive Child Care and Family Resource Center and to raise money for child care scholarships at the First Annual Thrive Harvest Gala. We had fabulous food from People's Food Co-op, live music, a silent auction, a live auction, and a presentation on the story of Thrive and the families it serves.



Pete and Judi Schuller, an anonymous donor, and Thrivent Financial underwrote the event allowing us to give all funds raised at the event to the scholarship fund, and an anonymous donor matched the funds pledged at the event. This added up to \$44,466. Wow.

Thrive currently offers scholarships to around 20% of its families, but we hope to grow that number to 50% in the next decade and your participation in that has meant so much.

What a fabulous first event! I'd like to thank our sponsors, the best gang of volunteers any church staff could dream up, and our attendees.

Worried you missed out? Fear not. I suspect we will have another fabulous event in the future, and you are always welcome to make a donation to the Thrive Scholarship Fund through the church, our website or to Thrive itself.



SNM regularly serves around 70 guests with food partially sourced from Channel One Food Shelf and sourced from other local stores with items both donated and purchased. Saturday Noon Meals continues to have beautiful donated fresh flowers every week from one local store. Simply amazing!

Volunteer workers at Saturday Noon Meals are sometimes guest/volunteers, CUMC members, individual community members, groups from other churches, service groups, and extended families who just want to help. There continue to be several groups that choose to volunteer monthly or quarterly. An amazing sight every Saturday though, is the "beehive" of folks working to prepare, serve and clean-up after the meal. This volunteer component is very supportive and so very necessary.

In 2020, we anticipate that we will begin asking for items from the congregation as a method of helping support the program such as collection of toiletries from hotel stays or perhaps more focused requests such as socks, laundry detergent and deodorant. We will provide more information about our needs as additional planning and discernment occurs. We will have many opportunities for continued involvement and support as we move forward.

Do you know about the Memorials & Living Gifts Committee?

A summary report is presented each year near Memorial Day, but the committee thought the congregation might like a more frequent update.

At quarterly meetings, among other reports, the committee reviews the current requests, and hears written reports from past recipients. Gifts are acknowledged. Awards are presented to as many of these requests as possible, based on available funds at the time.

At our most recent meeting, the group read reports and saw photos of how the funds previously awarded enabled the church to participate in PrideFest, Thrift on Fifth to purchase badly needed new signs, and Garden Group to improve the perennial labyrinth garden to attract pollinators. We also teamed up with the CUMC Foundation and we split the cost for the new stacking chairs in Wesley

The committee then approved funds to help Worship Arts create wedding banners for the sanctuary, allow office staff to subscribe to a Txt2Give to program that's compatible with our database system, allow three groups in the church to sponsor an impactful, upcoming art installation and provide funds for Outreach to continue their plans for the New Year's Retreat.

Did you know that anyone can contribute to the Memorial and Living Gifts Fund at any time and for any reason? Donations can be presented to the church to celebrate a milestone...or send a donation in someone's name because they did something nice...or just because. As one can see, these Living Gift funds benefit us all in many ways.

Have you been on the lower level of our church on a Saturday morning recently? If not you are missing an amazing experience. It's a church within our church. Thrift on Fifth opens at 9am and there are always customers waiting for the opening of doors. This Saturday morning we witnessed Saturday Noon Meal people gathering ingredients from their storage room for a fine Thanksgiving feast: turkey, potatoes, squash, and all the fixings.

A few of us from the store recently attended a workshop on homelessness that was sponsored by the Rochester Public Library. We learned about how crucially important it is for us to greet people with warmth, kindness, and respect. Some of our patrons who have been experiencing homelessness have felt rejection and the hurt of people turning the other way for quite some time. It's dehumanizing to not be noticed. 90 percent of the people we see who are experiencing homelessness don't fit the stereotypes that we have come to associate with living on the street. Therefore, we need to treat everyone "as if."

Saturday morning is a community of regulars and newcomers. On this morning, people were happy because the day was sunny and decently warm and they soon would be eating a turkey feast. Our Arise band was filling the building with the best music in town, as they rehearsed for the Sunday service. There was a plethora of beautiful clothing to behold. Warm coats, mittens, hats, and boots had been donated by members of CUMC. It was a bustling, noisy, crowded, happy day. It was community at its best.

We learned at the library-sponsored workshop that for people experiencing homelessness there is a "time horizon." People need to focus on their immediate needs of shelter, clothing and food before they can focus on tasks such as applying for jobs. That time

horizon is usually a period of 24 hours. We also know that factors such as systemic racism, trauma, generational poverty, and mental illness add exponentially to how hard it is to get out of the grips of homelessness.

In the midst of great poverty and injustice there is still grace, hope and an invitation to be full and equal participants in God's abundance at this church on Saturday mornings. We invite you to experience the miracle with us. ~Bobbi Nichols
