This is a tough beginning to March.

We are still quite snowed in, plowing into what is traditionally our snowiest month in Minnesota (spring break shoveling!) Physically going to school seems to be "soooo 2018." Just getting around or getting life done feels extra challenging. As of right now there is "Mt. Methodist" in our parking lot,



And, the United Methodist church seems to have lit a match in the gas-filled room of General conference delegates, causing an explosion of debate and hurt and an uncertain future.

This is the perfect way to start Lent.

Often when the world is painful we try to make the struggle go away as soon as possible. We eat all the sugar we can find, pour a drink, check the phone, turn on the television, or start Google-ing furiously looking for answers that help us feel better. (You can find any opinion on the internet if you look hard enough, either to convince you all is well, or else to tell you that the tiny scratch on your hand is cancer.) We are reactive. We are ready to end the discomfort, NOW.

What Lent is about is exploring the discomfort. Resisting that impulse to jump from problem to quick-fix, and sit in the struggle to find the best way forward.

You have probably heard of or seen the Japanese practice of "kintsugi" before, as our Lenten-series photo demonstrates. This is the practice of fixing broken pottery with precious metals, a part of the Japanese philosophy of wabi-sabi, which calls for seeing beauty in the flawed or imperfect. It is about highlighting the fractures, not hiding them. The gold is a gorgeous reminder not only about restoration, but also that preserving worthwhile objects takes work. To keep functional we have to continually polish and protect and restore and repair, because entropy reigns and anything neglected will move towards dust and disintegration. A bowl is not a bowl forever unless we take good care and practice intentionality towards it.



"It is appalling that the most segregated hour of Christian America is eleven o'clock on Sunday morning." - Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Race is not an easy topic and many of us are afraid of saying the "wrong thing."

So we stay silent.....and silence doesn't help.

To this end, we are bringing a series of discussions about race to the table at CUMC. We believe that church is exactly the right place for this work to proceed and we hope to provide a space where people feel brave enough to explore the topic together.

Each set of discussions is composed of 6 sessions. Our session themes are:

- Race and the Criminal Justice System
 - This fall we used the book, "The New Jim Crow," as a background for our work. Pastor Kendall Hughes, newly retired chaplain at the Federal Medical Center, led us in these discussions.
- De-centering Whiteness
 - Our winter discussions are being held on February 3, February 17, March 3, March 17, March 31, and April 7. This discussion is bringing up a lot of emotion. We are unpacking terms like "white privilege," "white nationalism," "white supremacy," "white complacency," "white fragility," and "white guilt." It is being led by Kristin Perry, instructional coach.
- Race and Poverty

• We intend to use the book, "Strangers in Their Own Land" by Arlie Russell Hochschild for our spring session. Nicholas Wysocki, professor in the Department of Education at Winona State University, and Bobbi Nichols, psychologist, will be leading these discussions.

Each discussion is designed to "stand alone," so that participants are encouraged to attend as frequently as possible, but will not feel lost if they are able to attend only sporadically.

Nicole Nfonoyim-Hara has developed a website that we hope to use as a resource in the future for broader influence. The Rochester Racial Justice Toolkit and other resources are listed on the CUMC website (<u>cumethodist.com</u>) under the tab, "Social Justice."

It has been a highly collaborative process and we have been encouraged by congregational interest and participation so far.

Accordingly, leaders of our local Rochester ISAIAH group have organized an "in-district meeting" with Sens. Senjem and Nelson, and both have accepted the invitation! News from Hopeful Earth

CUMC has committed to Minnesota Interfaith Power & Light (MNIPL) to become a sustaining member and enroll in a 1 year congregational certificate program, *Be the Spark: Climate Justice Congregations. Per MNIPL:* "This year long process will help you and your community gain the focus, resources and support that can help galvanize your faith community into committed climate action. Join a growing number of faith communities doing the same, joining together across many faiths raising a collective voice and driving concrete projects for faithful action on climate justice."

What is MNIPL:

"MNIPL is an interfaith community co-creating a just and sustainable world. We work in partnership with faith communities to build transformative *power* and bring the *lights* of people's unique gifts to addressing the climate crisis.

At MNIPL we work to build the interfaith climate movement in Minnesota by empowering faith communities across the state to take action that is authentic, effective, and energizing in their context.

We do this in two ways: leadership development programs and action opportunities that provide tangible ways to make an impact. We believe that it's not enough to offer people opportunities to take action on the issues they care about. Instead, we believe leadership development and organizing training empower individuals to build a movement capable of creating a just and livable climate for the human and more than human world."

Immigration Support Update

Legal defense funds are needed for undocumented residents of Southeast Minnesota and Olmsted County! Undocumented immigrants with legal council are 10 times more likely to be granted legal residency than those without. It is estimated that the undocumented population of Southeast Minnesota is 5,800 of which 2,800 live in Olmsted County.

Southeastern Minnesota Interfaith Immigrant Legal Defense (SMIILD, a group of churches and immigrant support organizations) working through the Diversity Council is hoping to raise \$50,000 in church and private donations. Local units of government will be asked to support \$50,000. Grants are being written for another \$50,000. If \$150,000 is raised, roughly 3/4 the cost of an attorney for legal services and related brochures and services will have been met.

CUMC's Mission and Social Justice committee has voted to match member donations for the first \$1000 raised and another donor has offered to match the next \$1000. Donations must be made to CUMC with a notation for Immigrant Legal Defense. Please consider a donation.

Notes from Pastor Nancy

Congregational Care at Christ UMC is for members, friends and guests. These Caring Ministries are for all whom God brings to our awareness whether in our building or out in the community of Rochester or out into the world.

We believe prayer is the foundation of Congregational Care.

If you have a prayer request, we ask you to consider one or several of the following options: Prayer by the pastors, the Prayer Chain, and/or prayers listed in the bulletin. The Prayer Chain consists of members who pray for all for whom they receive requests. The request is given by merely passing along the first name of the person(s) needing prayer. Please notify the office of your request.

Want a visit in the hospital? Please note that you need to contact us or have a family member or friend contact us to tell us that you are in the hospital and want a visit. We no longer have access to names of people who are hospitalized.

Those in town for medical care – Pastors and Parish Ministers are available to provide spiritual support such as prayer, communion, anointing and holy listening. Please contact the church office to request a contact.

Want to talk to a pastor? Please contact the office to make an appointment with one of the pastors

Have a Pastoral Emergency? During business hours, please call the office. There is always a pastor on call. After hours and on weekends, please call the office and listen for the phone message which will have the phone number of the pastor on call. Then call that number to reach the pastor on call.

Want to serve in Congregational Care? Training is provided for the following Ministry Teams:

- The Prayer Chain passes along the name of the persons requesting prayer and pray for them daily.
- Lay Visitors call on homebound members once a month or more.
- Parish Ministers call on members and friends of Christ UMC facing a major life challenge such as job loss, divorce, addiction, serious illness, death of a loved one. They receive extensive training and meet once a month with Pastor Nancy

Communion Ministry: Coordinate and Provide Communion for the three Sunday morning services and for homebound communion.

Memorials and Living Gifts Committee oversees thanking those who give memorials and living gifts to CUMC as well as approves funding requests for undesignated gifts. They also keep records of gifts.
