March is a capricious month. Coming and going, lion or lamb, March is witness to the changeability of life. With so much that is unknown, where is surety to be found?

As followers of The Way we believe that the teachings of Jesus give us opportunity to learn the heart of God.

Here at Christ Church we are committed to sharing the teachings of Jesus in all seasons.

All of March we will be in the season of Lent.

Lent is a time for us to consider what it means to follow Jesus into places of sure pain.

As a church we are reading together Dr. Amy-Jill Levine's book *Entering the Passion of Jesus*. Dr. Levine is a Jewish scholar who finds power and meaning in the teachings of Jesus. As we enter the passion of Jesus shared through the scriptures often read during Holy Week, Levine invites us to consider what it is Jesus risked in order to teach us the ways of life.

Considering what Jesus risked leads us to the question:

What are we willing to risk?

Week by week we will read Levine's book and consider during worship how it is Jesus risked reputation, anger, challenge, rejection, loss of friends and temptation. Through Jesus we learn that living in his way means being willing to live with the tension involved in risking.

What is it in the teachings of Jesus that calls you to move from the center of comfort into the wilderness of risk?

Pick up a book in the office, join a small group, read on your own, and join in the Jesus story of risk.

Also during Lent we invite you to read the daily devotional created by the writing and heart gifts of this congregation. We asked people to reflect on how it is God shows up in their lives. Our prayer is that each day of Lent you too are called to be on the look-out for holiness in your own life.

Give thanks; believers, agnostics, doubters, and all of God's beloveds.

As the uncertainties of our national and denominational lives play out, trust the grounding of God's presence.

In the midst of chaos, God created all that is and called it good.

That creation continues yet.

Blessings be yours during this season of Lent.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude for the people of CUMC that we can report that all Transform projects have been completed and that we have paid off the line of credit loan we have been using to bridge project expenses while pledge income has been coming in during the past two years.

You may recall that early in the Transform planning stages our consultant advised us based on interviews with church leadership and congregants that we could **expect** pledges in the neighborhood of \$750,000.

The preliminary estimates for our top priority projects (THRIVE!, Sanctuary and Good Sheperd Window upgrades, and 8 new exterior window panels) came to \$800,000. We

also wanted to replace the remaining 8 window panels, add a handicapped accessible restroom, renovate the ECC restrooms and upgrade the Wesley Hall kitchen. This added another \$288,000 and since it was early in the process we anticipated unforeseen costs of \$100,000, bringing the total to \$1,188,000.

So we set ourselves a stretch goal of \$1,250,000.

We received pledges of \$1,490,000. You are awesome!

In addition, prior to the campaign the Leadership Board had committed \$110,000 in undesignated bequests to the project and in the time since the pledge phase of the campaign ended we have received other gifts and grants of \$115,000 bringing total potential funding to \$1,715,000.

After taking into account contingencies for uncollectible pledges and unanticipated construction costs we settled on a budget of \$1,385,000 including planning and fundraising costs, leaving us about \$180,000 in uncommitted funding.

What have we accomplished?

- THRIVE! has been up and running in a beautiful space for more than a year and is financially self-sustaining. They have over 50 children and enrollment is growing. 14% of families and 27% of children receive some level of tuition assistance, another tribute to the generosity of this church.
- 16 energy efficient exterior window and door panels have been installed replacing the original single pane panels.
- We have a new highly efficient HVAC system in the education wing that services THRIVE! and the classrooms above.
- The Wesley Hall kitchen has been upgraded to serve THRIVE!'s and the church's needs. Air conditioning will be installed this spring.
- The Good Shepherd Window has been repaired and protected.
- A projection system has been installed in the sanctuary
- A handicapped accessible restroom has been installed in the ECC hallway.
- The other two restrooms in that hallway have been refurbished.
- Along the way we have performed extensive asbestos abatement in the lower level.


Where are we?

Through January pledge and other income has been \$1,493,000 and expenses have been \$1,477,000. The cost overruns are primarily associated the HVAC upgrade from original plans, the Good Shepard Window repair and asbestos abatement.

Outstanding pledges (due by Dec. 31, 2020) are over \$235,000. There are projects waiting in the wings that the Leadership Board will prioritize and present to the congregation when we receive these funds.

To summarize:

- Transform projects are complete.
- Our loan balance is zero.
- We anticipate additional gifts that will be used for projects prioritized by the Leadership Board.




and this year (2020) to date they have donated 53 (and it's only March!)

Fun facts about the church van

It holds 12 riders, one driver and two wheelchair riders. There are five wonderful drivers, 19 potential riders, and assorted walkers held in place with bungee cords. The route to and from church takes about two hours to complete.

The number of potential riders has grown in recent years, whereas the number of drivers has not; a potential area of service to the church, hint, hint. You need to be healthy, have a short physical (which the church pays for), have a good driving record and a cheerful personality. Contact Stew Swanson or Kent Nymann for more information.

Allene Shipman calls riders each week to see if they would like a ride on Sunday. She then notifies the driver so s/he can plan the route. Thank you Allene.

One driver remembers the two previous vans. Della Goodman used to be the caller some 18 years ago. She rode shotgun in that first van. The second van had wheelchair accessibility. Orville Kirkham made use of that feature. He was very attentive and would let the driver know when the light turned green. Riders and drivers are glad to have a newer van. The previous one had some problems.

There is a great sense of belonging on the church van. The people know each other and tease each other. They enjoy the ride and the friendship. One rider calls her friends on Sunday mornings to make sure they are awake. The riders like watching the change of seasons. They celebrate birthdays, if given enough time to prepare! Several riders sit together in church.

All are very grateful to the amazing drivers who give of their time each Sunday morning. Drivers are: Stew Swanson, Glenn Roberts, Nancy Currier, Patrick Hokanson and Del Lawson. They tell me driving the van is a joy and a privilege.



Each month one of our Parish Ministers is on call.

They check the chaplain's list at Mayo Hospitals. They make hospital and home visits at the direction of Pastor Nancy. People who are sick, grieving, or have other needs for spiritual support and care receive visits. For the month of March Kendall Hughes will be serving in this role.
