Pastor's Pen with katy lee, associate pastor

I only want to say
If there is a way
Take this cup away from me
For I don't want to taste its poison
Feel it burn me
I have changed



I'm not as sure, as when we started -Gethsemane, JC Superstar

A few of our church folks—confirmation student Logan Ackerman and his father, Brent—are in Jesus Christ Superstar at the Civic theater. I usually wait to listen to the soundtrack for that musical for Holy Week, in the same way that I (usually) wait for Christmas music until Advent. But we had the opportunity to go to a preview showing as a confirmation group in the middle of Lent, so the songs are in my head a few weeks early this year. These songs are spinning through my head and heart right now, and I am thankful, for now is when I need them the most.

I have had "Gethsemane" in my head on repeat. Change is afoot, and it doesn't always feel good. Spring is in the air, yes, and we celebrate the return of the sun and wave goodbye gladly to the snow. But basements are flooding. And as we reflected last month, the United Methodist Church is still writhing, struggling with disconnection and distorted identity. Much feels broken or lost. We are grieving. And, there was a terrorist attack against Muslims in New Zealand. Life spirals up and down inconsistently. Spring, the tussle of lion and lamb. These challenges, this Lenten season, can, drip by drip, like spring icicles erode our confidence in ourselves, in our favorite people, in the institutions we helped build.

But no change happens without a way that we can step in as the hands and feet of Christ and spark hope. There are many places where people are planning and planting, around the world and the country and in Minnesota, a new world of a renewed church. Your pastors are a part of the movement, and we hope you will continue to join us. You'll find some links and websites that provide resources for any questions you might have, so that you can stay involved, stay informed and spark change yourself.

Yes, Holy Week is coming, and that includes Good Friday. Walking through the pain alongside a God who chose to become marginalized is exhausting. Worshipping a God who invites us to a life of struggle and rejects the easy-way-out is crazy-making. I read some lines from a Mary Oliver poem called *Hurricane* that inspires me in this time. It starts with—would you believe it—a hurricane. A storm that gives "the back of the hand to everything." And then she says:

Listen now to what happened to the actual trees; toward the end of that summer they pushed new leaves from their stubbed limbs. It was the wrong season, yes, but they couldn't stop. They looked like telephone poles and didn't care. And after the leaves came blossoms. For some things there are no wrong seasons. Which is what I dream of for me.



Winter Connect Groups are drawing to a close. Are you ready for spring?






bodies. We want our children to know and love their bodies, know that God created and loves their bodies, and affirms them for who they are always, at



And we celebrate with a list of joyfulness:

It is a joy to see you, our church family. We come to know you better through your donations and your purchases and through your willingness to just stop by and chat. Every now and then we notice one of you wearing something we donated to worship on Sundays. And you will notice us wearing your donations too. It is a joy to serve the community. About half of our regular customers are not members of Christ United Methodist Church. One of our favorites has figured out that Wednesday afternoon is the very best time to visit us because we have just hung volumes of new items the day before during our Tuesday morning organizational party. She is there at 4pm, scans the store within a matter of minutes, and checks out in time to get to her 4:30 pm yoga class.

It is a joy to see new customers. Word is spreading that we have the best deals in town. People cannot believe it at first. "You mean this coat only costs a dollar!?" Some need an item so much that they count out their change with angst that they might not have enough. In these cases, we develop sudden onset counting disorders and declare that what they have is good... just perfect... sold! Or, another shopper in the store hears the anxiety, and quietly pays for the item.

It is a joy to receive the donations that our congregation and others give. We like to (and usually) receive laundered or dry-cleaned items folded and bagged or left on hangers. We receive treasured clothing from spouses or children of loved ones that have passed. We receive donations from people like Randy Peterson who hand-knitted at least 40 warm hats, which were purchased and enjoyed by millennials and octogenarians alike. It is a joy to savor our iconic stories, some of which we think should be written and illustrated as children's books:

Elizabeth's Purse
