

Life is amazing gift.

Here at church, we are given opportunity to savor life and share in its unfolding.

Recently a woman contacted our church. Her parents were members here. They had included the church in their estate plans. She was eager to know what we might be able to accomplish through the power of her parent's generosity.



Why that project?

She shared the story of her parents. They grew up in deep want. Her mother was so accustomed to using and maximizing what she had that she literally saved the thread from clothes that had been worn through. She stored the thread on buttons, and reused it in her sewing. Being excellent stewards was part of every day life. So too was living with mobility challenges. The couple who left the bequest gift for the church endured immense challenges due to an illness that came into their lives and rendered one of them profoundly physically challenged. They faced the challenges and created deeply loving home together.

Life in their home was about maximizing blessing, and they did.

Upon the death of her parents, their daughter learned that they had financial assets she never imagined. Her parents worked hard, they saved, and they wanted to pass on their gratitude through gifts to the church that would bless others.

And so they have. Not only has the fully accessible bathroom been added; the bequest gift will also pay for the refreshing of the other bathrooms on the main level.

Imagine. Teasing out the thread from well-worn clothes in order for new creations to be crafted.

That story is our story. Because these beloveds found life here and shared life through this church, their witness creates grace for generations to come.

We're in a time of transition here at church.

The recent shaking of our United Methodist foundations has many of us wondering kind of church we will leave to generations to come.

The Leadership Board and I want to provide opportunities for us to gather and learn together.

Children (and all human beings) do not belong in cages!

Global Ministries encourages churches to give in support of the <u>global migration</u> Advance #3022144.

The mission agency is also encouraging churches and individuals to make Sunday, June 30, a <u>Sunday of solidarity for suffering children</u>.

The United Methodist Church opposes "immigration policies that separate family members from each other or that include detention of families with children," according to the Social Principles. In the United Methodist Book of Resolutions, the church calls on the government to end indefinite detention and the incarceration of children.

<u>The United Methodist Board of Church and Society</u> is calling on United Methodists to tell Congress and President Donald Trump to end child detention and family separation.

The social action agency of the church encourages everyone — including children and youth — to write letters to the government calling for immediate reform.

Doing Well and Doing Good

On any given Wednesday evening or Saturday morning you will find a wonderful menagerie of people at Thrift on Fifth, church and community members alongside individuals experiencing poverty, long term homelessness, mental health challenges, and addiction. These things are not barriers and do not separate shoppers; each shopper comes to find gently used clothing, many are greeted by name, all are warmly welcomed, and none are turned away. Many of those shopping are regulars and are quick to catch the volunteers up on the news of their week, and a couple periodically bring treats or hugs for the volunteers. The warm feelings are mutual, with volunteers frequently identifying items they believe regular shoppers would like and keeping an eye out for clothing items needed by others. Thrift on Fifth does well in terms of its mission to provide inexpensive clothing to the community and in turn provide funds for childcare subsidies, and it does good through its mission to expand our churches engagement with the larger community and further meet the needs of our neighbors.

While no item at Thrift on Fifth is over \$1, and children's clothing is only \$.50 per item, this small thrift store is gaining popularity and bringing people together. In 2018 Thrift on Fifth generated over \$10,000 in child care subsidies for families needing quality childcare, and 2019 has brought expansion of the men's department. Recycling Used Prescription Bottles

Christ United Methodist Church members have been participating in the program of recycling clean, clear brown prescription bottles for the past three years. Customs regulations prohibit opaque bottles and "over the counter" medication bottles. Labels must be removed (use **Goo Gone Citrus Gel** available at grocery stores). An estimated 15,000 bottles have been donated to the Rochester Medical Mission. These prescription bottles are sent to Haiti or to Operation Compassion, a mission warehouse in Tennessee. The bottles are processed and ready for use by pharmacies and clinics in the USA and worldwide, where ever there's a disaster. Many calls are received from pharmacies requesting clean prescription bottles to provide a safe, secure means of distributing medications. Your contribution is a vital support to Haiti and to agencies responding to disasters. Thank you for your participation in this effort to recycle plastic and reuse the prescription bottles. The labeled basket for your donated bottles is by the name tag boards.

Update on LED Lighting

We have finished changing out our lights to LED in the front entry, commons, office, ECC seating and stage, Fireside, and the hallway down to the children's wing. We replaced 165 flood lights in those areas. Twenty- seven floodlights were replaced in the altar area. We replaced 196 florescent lights in the commons and in the sanctuary above the side stained glass windows. Downstairs, 27 floodlights in the chapel were replaced and 64 of about 80 lights have been changed out in Wesley.



Notes From Nancy

- The Parish Ministry Team has been serving Christ UMC for the past two years.
