
Here at CUMC we believe that there is a feast of grace to share and we want to serve it up in ways that sustain.

Church in Transition

Thank you to all who participated in the July 28 forum hosted by the Leadership Board. The topic was, "What's Next?" for CUMC as we go forward and "Who Are We?" as a congregation. We are living in a time of many questions and great ambiguity.

We know that there are different views regarding the full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ persons as clergy and as human beings desiring to marry

one another. We seek to hear the wisdom of all people who call CUMC their home.

We divided into smaller groups at the July 28 session to better hear the hearts of those who were present. Individuals made the following comments which were then reported back to the group as a whole. (Some of the comments represent widespread views and some may represent the thoughts of one or a few people.)

- * We (persons on the Leadership Board) need to keep meeting with the congregation, updating, and listening as we go forward.
- * We need to acknowledge that people, no matter their viewpoints, struggle with the full inclusion issue and that everyone belongs in this struggle together.
- * It might be helpful to discuss these issues in the small groups that have already been formed in the church, such as Sunday School groups, handbell choirs, book groups, pie baking groups, etc.
- * Offer opportunities for one-on-one discussions, as some people will find this format to be more safe.
- * Keep an updated FAQ document available for an easy to read resource.
- * Have information sent out in separate mailings rather than embedded within the newsletter.
- * The "Altar for All" document is too broad and it needs to tie back to our (the Leadership Board's) Guiding Principles and Covenant.
- * The inclusion discussion is best addressed in the pulpit when it ties in with the text.
- * There needs to be strong lay support for our clergy during this time in particular.
- * It needs to be clarified that the "Altar for All" document does not represent a disaffiliation document nor is it necessarily a precursor to disaffiliation.
- * A lot of work (and time) was spent in the lay-led movement toward becoming a reconciling congregation. It would be good to review that process and use the knowledge gained. "For The Bible Tells Me So" was an effective video at that time.
- * We need to involve our youth in this process.
- * We need to remember that God is with us in this.

The Leadership Board will work on addressing these points. People who have additional thoughts, questions or concerns may contact a member of the Leadership Board or our clergy at any time. The General Conference will meet again in May of 2020. Many Annual Conferences and congregations throughout the country are organizing themselves and dealing with "What's next?" and "Who are we?" We are not alone in this. We want to do as Bishop Ough has urged -"Go Together and Go Strong." What that looks like is not yet known.

Rev. Beth Joyner - Adult Choir Director - Beth will continue as our adult choir director. Beth is a chaplain at Mayo and is gift to our program.



Thoughts on our Fire Alarm Sunday Aug. 10,2019

On Sunday, August 10th, our fire alarm system was activated during our 9 am worship service and we did an evacuation of the sanctuary and exited outside. Fortunately, there was not a fire. It turned out to be a defective smoke alarm that set off our alarm system. The Church Safety Committee, the next week, reviewed how the evacuation of the building went and developed an improvement plan for what we could do better. First, we would like to thank members of our congregation, visitors and staff for your cooperation in evacuating the building.

Members of the Church Safety Committee have shared the improvement plan with our ushers and church staff and also took their input on how we might improve. We found there was some confusion on whether it was a malfunction of the system or a real fire. We need to evacuate the building whenever the fire alarm goes off. We should never assume it is a malfunction, the fire department will decide that after they arrive.

When evacuating the building follow the directions of the lead pastor or designee, and the ushers. The Fire Marshall has asked that individuals with disabilities that use a walker, cane or just need more time to evacuate, wait where they are, and the ushers will help you get to the east hallway by the sanctuary. Staff and an usher will stay in the hallway to help you. If we have to evacuate down the stairs, the fire fighters will do the evacuation.

Parents with children in the children's wing should not go there to pick up your child. Our staff and volunteers will take the children out of the building and to the gathering place in the north east corner of the lower parking lot. You can meet your child there.

When evacuating the building follow directions of the ushers. When exiting from the front of the building, go out the exit door and move across the street to the west parking lot. Do not stand in front of the exit doors. Do not stop for a cup of coffee or get your coat.

If you have to evacuate to the north east lot move well away from the building. In cold weather, people in either lot could get in their cars but make sure in the north east lot you are well away from the building. If possible, we will have the church van available.

Within my first weeks here at CUMC I've attended the All-Church Camping trip, made introductions with many parents and youth and met some of the outstanding people here at CUMC.

I closed on my home in Country Club Manor on Friday, August 21, and already, five days later, I have an overwhelming sense of having arrived at home.

I am thrilled beyond words to be a part of such a loving, grace-filled congregation and I cannot wait to immerse myself fully into Christ's ministries—especially when my first impression of this fun crew was Coffee Wiffleball with Seated Outfielding.

Thanks again, so much for the warm welcome. I look forward to our future!



- EMAIL your city council members and RPU board members. They represent you they need to hear your views. 100percentrochester.org has their emails with suggested messages below.
- Show up to the city council public hearing 9/4 at 7:00pm.

What to say: Support, Values, and Irresponsibility.

- You don't need the perfect words. You don't need a strong voice. You don't need to go on and on. You just have to say you support 100% fossil free energy.
- If you want to say more say why. "I care about my neighbors," "God says to care for creation," "Global warming scares my grandkids," WHATEVER motivates you will resonate with someone else out there.
- ONE KEY PHRASE we want to repeat often and everywhere: "A gas plant is irresponsible."
