Pastor's Pen with elizabeth macaulay, lead pastor

Blessings to you in this season of new beginnings and limbo.

September is a month so full of promise and energy. A new school year offers opportunity to create connections and meaning. It is so good to come together after months of summer vacations and trips and family reunions and oh, that's right: It's not like that this year.

And yet.

We have a chance to create connections and meaning here at church. We have always had that opportunity and this year, more than any other, it feels particularly crucial to engage in bringing our faith to life.

We're in for a long stretch of adapting to pandemic-shaped living.

We won't gather for Rally Sunday in the ways we are used to doing. The commons area won't be jammed with tables and popcorn and zinging kids and coffee conversations. We are unable to gather in that way this year.

But we will gather and connect.

At 10:00 AM on the 13th we will have parking lot worship in our east lot. PLEASE COME! We will share communion, celebrate being church together, and then adjourn to a Trunk or Treat method of sharing ministry opportunities in the west lot. Various ministry initiatives will have information shared in the trunks of ministry area leader's cars. You can walk by - socially distanced and masked! - and pick up information and ideas for how to get connected.

There will be doughnuts. And popcorn. Need I say more?

We need each other. We need our connection through Jesus to be held to our hearts to sustain us in these days.

We will share an all-church read that reminds us of our need to live and lead change on purpose.

The book is called "Another Way".

It is written by three authors: Stephen Lewis, Dori Grinenko Baker, and Matthew Wesley Williams. Here is what Fransciscan priest Richard Rohr (we read his book together last year) has to say about this book:


"Here you will find a way of reengaging the Way of Jesus and exploring what that means, both at a personal and organizational level. Perhaps most importantly it grounds this exploration in voices and experiences of Black folk, addressing a long-standing gap in the literature on leadership, vocation, and the future of the Christian faith."

Another Way opens to us a process by which we can engage theologically - individually and as a community - with the challenges of this time.

As followers of Jesus we have so much work to do. The resistance of evil and naming of systems of oppression call for awakened and grounded discipleship.

I believe that "Another Way" can help us do the work to which we are called: "To resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms we find them." (United Methodist membership vow).

I invite you to join a small group to digest this book. It is an eight week learning opportunity. There are details in this issue of the Spirit to help you find the right group for you. (Page 4)



All groups will meet via Zoom. Sermons will be centered around the concepts and soul-stretch of the book.

To round September off we will gather in the parking lot on Sunday morning the 27th to honor those who have been members of Christ UMC for fifty years and more. Their names are listed in this issue of the Spirit. (Page 9) Please join us at 10:00 AM on the 27th to celebrate the constancy of discipleship that makes this church strong.

You see? It is a time of new beginnings grounded in day-to-day commitment to the Way of Jesus.



We patiently wait to be all together laughing and singing and will immediately return to the building as soon as safely possible!





Saturday Noon Meals Update

The Saturday Noon Meals program has continued to serve meals each Saturday during the pandemic. We delivered hot individual boxed meals to the Mayo Civic Center through August 1, 2020 and have since been delivering meals to the Salvation Army for the Saturday noon meal. The Salvation Army is currently partnering with the City of Rochester and The Landing to host a day program for the homeless and those in need.

Since March the Saturday Noon Meals program has served over 1,200 meals to the Rochester community day program! We are currently serving 50 hot boxed meals each Saturday and plan to continue to support the community day program through the pandemic. We have expanded our volunteer base slightly to allow Stew and Carol Swanson and Phil and Kathy Lombardo to take a few weekends away.

Our community partners continue their generosity with food resources and include People's Food Co-op, Thrive, Channel One, and Haven Valley Farm. We are beginning to partner with local gardeners and farmers to accept fresh produce that is currently in abundance. Please contact Stew Swanson and Kathy Lombardo if you have donations of fresh produce – they are greatly appreciated and make our meals so much better!

We would like to express our appreciation and gratitude to CUMC members and volunteers for your long-standing support of the SNMs program.

We look forward to seeing you in-person in the future.

Recent undesignated gifts have been used for signs for Thrift on Fifth, a better popcorn popper, new food carts for the kitchen and new chairs for the Commons.

Three Rivers Restorative Justice Program Needs Volunteers For Its First Year of Operation



Respect · Accountability · Healing

In recent months, the ways in which US justice systems use punishment and violence has once again come to the forefront of our national awareness. In addition to inequitable treatment of people of color, our justice systems inflict unconscionable suffering on those accused of crimes as well as their families. At the same time, those who are harmed by crime

all too often report feeling traumatized by the ways our justice systems fail to meet their needs.

On an average day in Rochester and surrounding Olmsted County 18 people report being a victim of property or violent crimes. That's 6,600 people who file an official report of being violated and victimized every year. At the same time, a 2017 survey revealed that less than one third of all people who suffer criminal harm in MN choose to report it. That means, seventy percent of the people in MN who are victims of crime choose not to report it to the police.

In Southeast MN there are two options for those who have been harmed by crime:

- The traditional justice system
- Do not report the crime

Most people who are harmed by crime choose option two.

However, a third option is emerging for those who suffer criminal harm in Rochester and Olmsted, Dodge and Fillmore Counties. Three Rivers

Restorative Justice (TRRJ), a new program based in Rochester, is collaborating with several justice system agencies to fill a need for Victim Offender Dialogue. Research has found that policies aiming to improve victim satisfaction must provide real means for victims to participate and feel heard in order to be effective.

Restorative Justice (RJ) believes that the community, those harmed and those who caused harm often have the ability to find creative options that can produce transformative resolutions. Instead of focusing on who is guilty and how to punish them, RJ focuses on who was harmed, what are their needs and who has the obligation to restore what was damaged by the harm.

TRRJ is a grass roots organization, formed by concerned citizens who want to offer victims of crime the opportunity to be heard, to have their questions answered, to have a voice in resolution and restitution, to regain trust, and to feel safer in their communities. At the same time, offenders are offered the chance to learn and to take responsibility to make things right.

TRRJ, in collaboration with the DFO Juvenile Justice Committee, is starting a pilot program in late 2020 and early 2021 that will seek to address the revolving door of jails and prisons. Instead of relying on punitive measures, which are ineffective at changing the heart or offering the skills needed, TRRJ relies on heartfelt, respectful, dialogues with those harmed and/or community members. Then a mutually agreed upon plan is developed that holds the person who caused harm accountable and offers all involved support and healing in ways punishment cannot. When restorative justice is thoroughly explained to crime victims, 80% of them choose it over the traditional justice system.

TRRJ is currently in need of volunteers who are willing to attend training for restorative justice facilitators. The total cost of the training will be \$75.00. It will be offered primarily online.
