Dear Church,

You are the living Body of Christ.

You listen to each other, serve meals, study scripture, donate and sell clothes, pack backpacks, supply CU Wednesday feasts, sing and ring blessing, pray for each other, witness for justice and healing, and bring your faith to life day-by-day.

It is such blessing to be alive and faith-grounded during a time when mistrust and fracture seem to be the assumed state of God's creation.

We know better.

Lent begins on February 14th this year. We will gather in the Sanctuary for an Ash Wednesday service at 7:00 PM. Ash Wednesday is a service for all ages. We name the miracle of being mortal people in the love and care of a loving God. We name our vulnerability and our hope as well as our awareness that this life we are given is precious gift. I hope you will come to worship. Ash Wednesday is about real and touchable human beings.

February can be a gunky month in Minnesota. We know this. So rather than despair, we are hosting a "Beat the Winter Blues" gathering here at church. We hope to welcome hundreds of people who are hungry for hope and connection (and chocolate!) Last year the social hall was alive with music and dancing and crafts and puppets. This is a great event to invite your neighbors to. We are a part of WinterFest for the greater Rochester area. Come and play! Details are in this newsletter. And now, a request:



Do you know that every week our church picks up people for worship? A month ago, while filled with precious cargo, one of the doors of our bus fell off.

No kidding.

A week later the doors had to be secured with a bungee cord in order to stay shut while the bus was being driven.

I suspect you will join me in saying this isn't right.

The Leadership Board has determined that we need to replace that bus. NOW. Our youth can no longer use it because it is unsafe outside of the city limits, and clearly, it is no longer safe within the city limits.

The cost of a new bus is in the \$50,000 range. The Leadership Board has authorized moving money from savings in order to pay for the bus. I believe there are those of you who might want to help pay for that bus, so I am asking for your help. If we could leave the money in savings that would be a great good.

Are you interested in helping the seniors who ride the bus make it to church without having parts fall off of the bus?

Are you interested in helping our youth go to the Boundary Waters and ASP (Appalachia Service Project) trips?

If you can help, please write a check to CUMC with "VAN" in the memo line and we will gratefully make the ride to and from church safer for all.

I know, we just had a magnificent Capital Campaign drive. I know, you are generous beyond the telling.

And, my boss in college told me a truth I will never forget: If you don't ask, you won't get.

So, I'm asking!



Hopeful Earth and Thinking About the Natural World

Attending an out of town church service this past weekend, I heard a sermon on Opportunities. We need to look for opportunities everywhere. Opportunities to help the church, opportunities to help others, opportunities to learn, opportunities for joy, and opportunities help the natural world. The Hopeful Earth group at CUMC focuses on the natural world!



Methodist beliefs include:

All creation is the Lord's, and we are responsible for the ways in which we use and abuse it. Water, air, soil, minerals, energy resources, plants, animal life, and space are to be valued and conserved because they are God's creation and not solely because they are useful to human beings. God has granted us stewardship of creation.

The modern world seems to be missing the opportunity to connect with the natural world. Not connecting to the natural world has some significant consequences.

Some things to think about in the natural world:

Driving an automobile creates emissions, wear and tear on the car creates a need to replace parts, fuel is a significant use of resources, replacing an iPhone requires significant natural resource mining, we easily waste electricity by leaving lights on and/or not using the most efficient lighting, coal requires landfill and creates emissions, fertilizing lawns is a cause of green lakes, and pesticides can affect more than just the targeted critters—bees are especially susceptible. WHEW. That's a lot to think about, right?

Please find and take opportunities to "Care for Creation"! We need to take care of the natural world, as it is our home and as Methodists, it is what we believe!

Drive less by planning short trips, ride a bike or bus for something different, plant a native plant garden or rain garden (no fertilizer needed), and use less or no fertilizer and pesticides on lawns and gardens.

Pastor Katy Ordination Update



Greetings all! I would greatly covet your prayers this month of February, as I reach my final step in my ordination process: Board of Ordained Ministry interviews, February 6-8th.

In 2011, I embarked on the beginning of my ordination journey, by enrolling at Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jersey and getting (anxiously, uncertainly) connected with my home state's Annual Conference. The advice given to me by my former associate pastor was "start the process before you're ready: better too early than too late!" so I jumped in, even though I was not sure which direction I was headed. My steps became clearer through my time in Seminary, and even more clear throughout these last four-ish years at Christ UMC. I was commissioned in 2016, turned in 60

pages of writings and information this December 1st, and now, here we are!

I feel incredibly prepared for these interviews, in large part because of YOU, dear church! The interviews are based on my experience of ministry and how my theology, beliefs and teachings have been affected by these experiences. They will ask me questions around my pastoral identity as a person (i.e. how I practice wholistic health and self-care), as a leader, and as theologian. Christ UMC has always been incredibly supportive of my continuing education, about respecting my personal life and time off: pastor as person, check! Christ UMC has taught me so much about being a bold leader and has encouraged me—as well as challenged me, in good ways—in my beliefs and teaching as a theologian.

Whatever happens in February, whether it's my time to wear the red stole this summer or not, I am so thankful for this place I am in right now and for how much I am learning here in Rochester. Thank you, a million times, for your prayers and all the ways you have supported me: I'll let you know how things go some Sunday in February, once news has been appropriately shared with all the other candidates.

Volunteer FPU (Financial Peace University) Coordinator— Colleen Johnson and Adult Education "Gurus"— Kathy Estry and Aileen Williams

Colleen Johnson:



In September 2015, my husband Bob and I were at a tipping point. Despite having a good income, we were drowning in debt. We had been listening to Dave Ramsey's radio program and tried to start implementing some of his seven "baby steps" to financial freedom but it was not until we attended the 9-week Financial Peace University (FPU) classes together in January of 2016 that things really clicked!

Since January of 2016 we have gone from 22 separate non-mortgage debt items to just two left to pay. By the end of 2018, we will be debt-free,

except for our home (and that will be paid off in just two more years). The ultimate goal of FPU is to be completely debt-free, build wealth and to be able to GIVE GENEROUSLY to those in need.

Attending FPU had a profound and positive impact on our lives. I have become passionate about helping others find hope and achieve financial peace through my work as a volunteer FPU Coordinator.

I am currently coordinating a 9-week FPU class at CUMC (Monday nights from 6:30-8:30pm in Mettam) and it has been exciting to see class members engaged in the process. Becoming debt-free is not easy but it is absolutely 100% do-able, regardless of age or financial situation. It requires changing spending and saving habits but the peace of mind that comes from knowing that you are in control of your money and eventually will owe NO ONE is amazing.

Third Sunday Forum— February 18th, 10:15 – 11:15am in the Hamline Room Immigrant Justice Issues and Sanctuary Church with Phil Wheeler, Rochester Unitarian Church

Approximately 11 million immigrants face the uncertainty of not being able to stay in the United States. If undocumented, immigrants are confronted by the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (or ICE) and are detained and transported away from their home area; often making it impossible for them to continue to work, be with family and/or remain in the U.S.

Come hear about the sanctuary process from Phil Wheeler, leader of the Rochester Unitarian Church's Sanctuary Church action. We will also hear from an immigrant service leader, an affected immigrant, another Sanctuary Support Church and the action underway at the Rochester Unitarian Church. Peace UCC Church has a sanctuary housing facility; and the Sisters of St. Francis-Assisi and the Quaker congregation are Sanctuary Support Churches.

The current plan is to educate the CUMC congregation about the sanctuary need and identify CUMC individuals interested in helping with this social justice need by supporting other Sanctuary Churches in Rochester. An ad hoc team (Gary Lueck, Larry Segar, Mary Schmidt and Cooper Wiggen) has formed to lead this effort.

Who Doesn't LOVE Chocolate on Valentine's Day?!



The answer is: the cocoa farmers who make as little \$0.50 per day growing and harvesting cocoa in Ghana and the Ivory Coast!

The cost of living in Ghana and the Ivory Coast is the same as it is in the USA. Thousands of children, as young as 5 years old, have been trafficked into slavery to work on cocoa farms.

The ugly truth is: most of the chocolate we buy in the U.S. is inexpensive because the people growing the cocoa live in poverty. They are poorly paid, or not paid at all, to keep our chocolate prices low.

Fair trade chocolate is different! Fair Trade Certification guarantees the cocoa farmers are paid enough money to support their families with food, education, and other essentials. Fair trade cooperatives receive both a fair price for the cocoa and a fair trade premium, which is spent to improve the community by building things like schools and health clinics. Fair trade prohibits child slave labor.

CUMC UWM (United Methodist Women) is working to educate our members and congregation about the importance of fair trade chocolate. Look for more information coming in the bulletin and look for the UMW fair trade table in the Commons on February 11th.

UMW and CUMC thank you in advance for supporting fair trade chocolate during the month of February!
