

Can you believe it? The TRANSFORM capital campaign is winding down and by all measures it has been an unqualified success! The Holy Spirit has moved among us and you, members and friends of Christ United Methodist Church, have pledged at the time of this writing \$1,428,922 to fund the renovation, restoration and remodeling of our church home to make it a more welcoming place for all, and to accommodate THRIVE!: a family resource and child care program designed to break the cycle of poverty.

The transformation has already begun! The THRIVE! 501c3 corporation has been established, a director for THRIVE! has been hired, and the THRIVE! Board of Directors is hard at work in anticipation of welcoming children ranging in age from infancy to pre-kindergarten to our space in September 2018. Our building will undergo extensive renovation this coming year to address the list of projects prioritized by the Trustees and the Master Facilities Team, including the remodeling necessary to open THRIVE! in our lower level.



Elder Network is a nonprofit organization founded in 1988 in Rochester, Minnesota. Their mission is to make sure that individuals impacted by the limiting effects of aging have an optimal quality of life. They believe this is also true for the caregivers of their clients. Elder Network serves three counties in Southeast Minnesota; Olmsted, Wabasha and Winona through support of non-medical services to elders in their own homes— an individual residence, apartment or elder community facility.

As the Community Engagement person, Ann wears many hats and is responsible for: Volunteer Recruiting & Retention, Donor Management, Outreach, Social Media and Communications, Education, and Fundraising/ Grants. For five years before moving to Elder Network, Ann worked at the Rochester Area Foundation as their Grants and Donor Management Officer.

In addition, they will offer visits to families with new babies and minister to our guests who are in town to seek medical treatment.

They have gone through extensive training on listening, confidentiality, prayer, grief and loss. Training has also included end of life concerns, spiritual support, family systems, the needs of children, youth and senior adults. They have also received training in offering communion and anointing to those who wish to receive it.

We will continue to offer the ministry of lay visitors to those who are homebound as well as the widowed persons ministry team who offer caring ministry to those who have lost a spouse. January Volunteer Spotlight:

Flower Ministry – Christmas Poinsettias— Elaine and Ken Bauman

The Flower Ministry team has been in place for many years. This is the third Christmas that Ken and Elaine Bauman have lead the way. What does it take to beautify the church and brighten the lives of a bereaved or homebound person at the holidays?

The first thing that happens: Ken and Pastor Nancy determine a rough estimate of poinsettias to order from Flowers by Jerry. They can determine this by using the last few years order numbers. We call that in by the flower shop's deadline date and confirm the number by the beginning of December.

Pastor Nancy and the office staff provide Elaine and her volunteers with lists for calling and cards for delivering and order forms for the bulletins and newsletter. Orders from the good folks of CUMC start pouring in. The staff and money counters keep track of this during Advent.

By mid-December, Ken's decorating volunteers are ready to receive the large delivery of poinsettias into the Commons for set up in the Sanctuary; some in the ECC and the Chapel. Thanks to the custodial staff for having the plant stands up in the Sanctuary, the crew can get started placing right away. The flowers were so big this year that more space was needed! The kneelers became impromptu plant stands as did the lily sandboxes.

This year, over sixty poinsettias went out the door to bring a splash of color to a church member who may be homebound or bereaved. Elaine says it's such a nice way for people to know they are remembered and thought of at church when they can't be active, and it brings beauty into their lives.

When all is said and done, about twenty volunteers partake in the Christmas Poinsettia Flower Ministry each year. We thank you for purchasing the plants, the Baumans for helping, those who lead the way for this ministry, and the current volunteers who help Elaine and Ken bring beauty to Christ United Methodist Church— in it's Sanctuary and beyond! Church Safety Committee



In early November, Pastor Elizabeth asked that a committee be formed to assess safety at Christ United Methodist Church (CUMC). A Church Safety committee was formed. Roy Schroeder, Paul Kirkham, Jerry Blaisdell, Emanuel Serstock, Jon Harrington, and Diane Ilstrup volunteered to be on the committee. The purpose of the committee is to go though the safety plans we have in place for CUMC and revise them, if necessary, or develop safety plans that may be needed.

We are currently developing a document that would spell out directions to staff and volunteers as to what to do for evacuation for fire, tornado and medical emergency. We will also be developing a plan for emergency and evacuation for an active shooter.

The committee has had Custom Alarm review our current placement of cameras and walked the building with us, suggesting new camera placements.

Officer Hilderbrant from the Rochester Police Department Crime Prevention came to our last meeting to review premise security and help us with possible changes in how we secure the building. He also provided us with a number of documents that we could use as we develop plans. The Fire Marshall will be meeting with us in January to go over our evacuation procedures for a fire.

As plans are revised or developed, we plan to have training with our staff and volunteers. We also plan to have an informational meeting, with anyone in the congregation that is interested in the church's safety plans.

We will be looking for volunteers to be on a CUMC safety team that would be trained to help in evacuations and medical emergencies, on Sundays. If interested, please contact Diane Ilstrup at deilstrup@msn.com.
