## Pastor's Pen with elizabeth macaulay, lead pastor

"Now that I've put you on a light stand - shine! Keep open house; be generous with your lives. By opening up to others, you'll prompt people to open up with God, this generous Creator in heaven." Matthew 5: 16 (The Message)

#### Happy September!

Fall is my favorite time of year. As temperatures drop and leaves crisp, energies rise. All things seem new and possible and promising.

This September, we will open the doors of THRIVE!: Child Care and Family Resource Center. We will be able to welcome 82 children, ages infant to preschool. Our ground floor is no longer a tired and dark place. There is light shining through the new windows and welcome extended through space and faces that shine.

We are shifting our rhythm for Sunday morning worship at nine AM. Rather than dismissing children after a children's lesson, we will have parents drop their children off before coming into the sanctuary. Why? We want a sense of safety for children and families. Relinquishing children mid service to leave in a herd is not comfortable for parents and sometimes overwhelming for children. By dropping children off prior to attending worship at nine AM, parents are able to meet the Sunday school teachers and know where their children are at all times. We'll have children join us for worship the first Sunday of the month for the whole service. And of course, if parents want their children with them in worship, we do too, regardless of which Sunday of the month it is. Children are always welcome and always safe here. That's our commitment.

Choir and music-making ensembles are starting up again. Please, consider yourself invited to join a singing or ringing group.

We are focusing on cultivating discipleship in the way of Jesus. This year we invite all members and friends to be involved in a Connect Group. Groups will meet once a week through October into mid November for six weeks. We'll have groups of people doing things like making pies or running, and groups of people gathered around books or topics. At each group,

members will spend time in prayer and checking in around this core Wesleyan question: How is it with

your soul? We'll be offering a "menu" of Connect and Class group opportunities throughout September so you can choose a group that meets at a time you find convenient and is engaging around a topic you are interested in.

During worship this September, we'll be looking at what it means to be a United Methodist in the midst of what can sometimes feel like a world steeped in madness. What do United Methodists believe, anyway? What are the promises we make when we become intentional disciples of a church?

Listen: While the world around us seems to be tearing itself apart (witness the street repair all around us!) the people of God are called to be "repairers of the breach and restorers of the street where people live" (Isaiah 58: 12).

What we celebrate here in this church and through this church is the transformational power of Jesus the Christ. The power of love emboldens us to name our belief that Black Lives Matter. The power of love emboldens us to know that we are light stand people shining welcome to all people. No exceptions. None.

I shared with you a definition of power that I like: Power is the ability to get things done. I heard a better definition the other day that goes something like this: Power is the ability to see that all people are cared for and respected.

Jesus came that we might know life in abundant ways. Abundant life begets and inspires abundance for all.

What blessing it is to keep open house and to be generous with our lives.

The world is light-starved.

Let us shine, church. Let us shine.



We are starting a new thing, this 2018.

Confirmation is now not just for our 8th-9th grade

students, although we still intentionally invite students of this age into the process: All are welcome to commit to this 2-year journey.

Do you want to ask the tough questions in community? Are you willing to step out and wrestle with the gray areas, the uncertainties, and the answers? Do you want to encounter God in a real, life-giving way? You will not walk away looking like anyone else, or everyone else: you will walk away becoming more deeply YOU, who God created you to be. We are not about cookie-cutter faith here.

Here are the expectations:

• *Class attendance:* We ask you make this commitment your priority for these 6-8 week increments. We promise you will not regret this

season!

- Church attendance 3x a month: Can't make it one week? No worries, our services are online! To keep track and keep learning together, we'll ask for a paragraph written (by hand, typed, texted, emailed, whatever!) of sermon and service notes 3 times a month.
- *For youth*: March confirmation retreat: March 1-2, 2019!
- One "challenge" opportunity per semester (spring/fall): These include any offsite trips (Boundary Waters, ASP, Fall service days, The Event) or internal opportunities (Greeting, ushering, Vacation Bible school service). You'll check in with your small group leader to confirm participation.
- Family participation: a parent, guardian or mentor is expected to be at confirmation every week.

## Third Sunday Forum: **Informed Voting**

September 16th at 10:15 AM in the Hamline Room

Presenters: Kathryn Gardner and Aileen Williams

"We live in a world where unfortunately the distinction between true and false appears to become increasingly blurred by manipulation of facts, by exploitation of uncritical minds, and by the pollution of the language." - *Arne Tiselius*, Swedish biochemist and Nobel Prize laureate in Chemistry

In this important election year, the ability to sort through the massive inundation of information is a formidable task. Fake news, disinformation, soundbites, and manipulation are increasingly employed to sway voters and to gain power.

What is the difference between fact and opinion? Where do we find reliable sources of information?

In the September forum these topics will be explored to help us become more informed citizens. An informed citizenry, the basis for a healthy democratic system of government, is a responsibility each of us should accept.

#### Ways to Connect

Our mission is to create committed Christ-followers for the transformation of the world. To do this we can't grow on our own. John Wesley believed it is through *participation* in small groups that we become Christ-followers. We invite you to test this by participating in at least one of these outstanding opportunities.

#### **Connect Groups**

Connect Groups are forming.
A sign-up and information table will be in the Commons September 9<sup>th</sup>.

Connect Groups: These groups will meet weekly for six weeks. The time and focus of the group will be centered around a shared issue or activity. The duration of the gathering is one hour. The core of the time together is developing relationship with the Holy and with each other. A host will hold the space meeting on site at church, in coffee houses or in homes.

Congregational Read: A book selected by clergy that everyone is invited to read individually or in a Connect Group. Worship will follow the "story" of the week raised in the book.



This fall, Bishop Ough will host a series of 15 gatherings across the Area to continue the Conversations on A Way Forward as the denomination prepares for the special session of General Conference on February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis. He will speak at CUMC on Wednesday, September 26 from 6:30 - 9pm.

All interested persons are invited to participate. However, Bishop Ough encourages lay and clergy members of Annual Conference, local church lay leaders and key local church leaders, in particular, to attend. Members of the Dakotas and/or Minnesota Conference delegations to the special session of General Conference will assist Bishop Ough in hosting the gatherings. This will provide an opportunity for the delegates to listen to and dialogue with participants.

These gatherings are timely for the following reasons:

- The members of the Commission on a Way Forward have completed their work, and their report has been submitted to the Commission on General Conference.
- The Council of Bishops has endorsed the One Church Plan.
- Other petitions related to the Commission's report will be available to the General Conference delegates and the church by this fall.

#### Immigration Justice

Rochester Sanctuary Status: All sanctuary spots in the twin cities are full and Sanctuary churches in Rochester have had no inquiries. The Rochester Sanctuary team is taking steps to increase community visibility.

Rochester area Immigration action: Pine Island city council voted yes to a private ICE detention prison. A Pine Island group has formed to protest and Rochester Immigration Coalition is supporting them in letter writing campaign and by attending the Pine Island City Council meeting on August 21 to protest allowing this prison.

Rochester Interfaith Immigrant Rights Coalition has changed their meeting time to the third Monday of the month from 6:30-8:30pm at the Universalist Unitarian Church to attract new members.

Accompaniment – Isaiah is moving away from Rapid Response to accompanying individuals to court and elsewhere. They are asking for individuals who would like to engage in the training and be in solidarity. Individuals need to be bilingual and somewhat flexible to go when needed and travel to the twin cities as all court hearings are done there.

#### I want to share with you an incredible thing.

The Lilly Endowment supports clergy renewal. The Endowment works with Christian Theological Seminary to invite clergy to consider what would enrich their lives and ministry and make their soul sing.

The United Methodist Church Book of Discipline provides for clergy to take a three month renewal leave every seven years.

Given that it has been over a decade since I last took a leave, I consulted with the Leadership Board about writing for a Clergy Renewal grant. The Leadership Board was supportive.

I wrote for a three month leave for Sabbath and for "wilding" time - time spent in holy places with space to be present to life and God's creation. Bobbi Nichols wrote on behalf of the Leadership Board to name support and rationale for this initiative.

I found out last week that the grant was approved!

Here is what the grant covers:

- A leave-taking reception at the church on January 12th, 2019
- Flight and lodging for Cooper and me in Cairns (we will snorkel the Great Barrier Reef) and the Whitsunday islands area in Australia for two weeks
- Flight to and trekking through New Zealand for two weeks
- Time at home
- Flight and time at Ghost Ranch in Albuquerque,

- New Mexico for a solo retreat for me two weeks
- Rental of an RV and time in sacred sites in the Southwest for Cooper and me.
- And, the cost of a group camp site and food for an intergenerational church-wide camping weekend at Whitewater State Park July 20 - 22nd of 2019.

Factored into the grant are guest preacher honoraria for one Sunday each month that I am gone. The church will continue to pay my salary while I am on renewal leave.

I'll be back in the midst of this community Holy Week of 2019 (April 14th or thereabouts).

I am able to step away for a time because Christ Church is served by a powerful staff and leadership.

This time of Sabbath and wilding will free my imagination and fill the sometimes-parched places of my soul. I will return from the renewal leave so full of gratitude and wonder. You can imagine that wide open spaces of time and the chance to read and ramble and be present to God's promptings will be life changing.

You will hear more about this and the implications of my being gone for three months as the time nears for my departure.

In the meantime, I had to share this good and incredible news.

Thanks for being the kind of church that blesses and sends - and welcomes back again!

#### Recap:

members have created an annual music festival right here in Rochester MN that seems to be here to stay!
