Pastor's Pen WITH ELIZABETH MACAULAY, LEAD PASTOR

"If not us, who? If not now, when?"

Like many powerful quotes, this quote above has been picked up by politicians and visionaries through the years.

The core power of the question was actually first uttered 2,000 years ago by a Jewish Rabbi by the name of Hillel.

Christ UMC has joined the chorus of those who ask the question: *God, what do you want to do through me?* If not us, who? If not now, when?

The TRANSFORM campaign is inviting us all to prayer and reflection. Why does Christ UMC exist? We are blessed by so much in the way of shared story. I had a community of people to love my children and lead them into the shine of their futures. That was thirty years ago. I had a husband and an education and so much privilege and thank God, I had a church that loved my babies as their own.

I don't know how parents without support from community make it through the day.

What I do know is that Jesus calls us to come alongside those who are weary and heavy-laden and offer shelter and welcome. Investing in the well-being of children and families is investing in the future.

If not us, who? If not now, when indeed.

Friends, this has been a years-in-the-making vision. This vision squares with the DNA of this congregation. Built upon that foundation, many hearts and minds have entered into the question of how it is this church is called to witness to the living Christ in this place and time.

We have our answer. We are called to be agents of transformation in the way of Jesus in order that children, families, and our whole community may thrive.

Thank you for the power of your witness – past, present, and future. Let us be grounded in the past as we grow the future.

And join me in curiosity about who that pastor in 2077 will be. What story will she/he/they tell?



Call for Leadership Board Members

In January of 2015, Christ UMC began a new day. Based on our Missional Church Consultation Initiative prescription #1, we adopted a more nimble leadership structure.

The Leadership Board of Christ UMC was created through a process of application, interview and commissioning. We have nine individuals who have served this church with distinction. Together we have crafted Guiding Principles and we are crafting policies and procedures to lead us forward in healthy ways.

Anything that does not change stagnates, so it is time to consider who might be next called into service on the Leadership Board. A number of our current members are ready to step down, creating opportunity for others to apply for the vacant seats.

Those who serve on the Leadership Board need to be living their membership vows: Leaders are individuals who support their church through regular worship attendance, financial giving, prayers, presence, service and witness. Leaders also must be supportive of the five prescriptions cited in our MCCI report, since that document is grounding our forward momentum as a church. The Nominations Committee of the church will assess the applications and conduct the interviews for the open positions, with new Leadership Board members being commissioned in January of 2018.

I ask you to pray about your sense of God's call at this time. **The Leadership Board meets on the first and third Thursday of the month, from 5:30 – 7pm**. We spend time in prayer and spiritual reflection as well as the crucial issue of governance for this movement outpost called church.

I encourage you to consult with any of our current Leadership Board members to discuss their experience. This is an exciting time in the life of our congregation. The work done by the Leadership Board is a reflection of the Spirit moving through our congregation.

Consider being part of that movement! Applications are available at the front desk, in the office and online. Interviews will take place in late November.

May God nudge you gently.





Gallery 405



Holy, Holy, Holy

In 2013, our family traveled to Guatemala so our son, John Edmund, could be exposed to the country and the culture for the first time, as he was too young to accompany us on the CUMC mission trips. One of the memorable things for me on that trip was participating in the morning devotions at the Project Salud y Paz Clinic. Devotions were in Spanish so I didn't get too much out of the words, but the experience always felt so right. This public ritual, with the patients literally waiting to see the doctor in the next room within hearing distance (as shown in the photo), occurred while the entire staff listened to a local Methodist pastor, Pastor Sebastian, lead us in hymns, give a short message, and end with a heartfelt prayer. Due to a breakdown in relations between Project Salud y Paz and the Guatemalan Methodist church, those devotions stopped in early 2016. Jan and I continued to greet Pastor Sebastian enthusiastically whenever we saw him.

I'm pleased to say our new Executive Director, Kristen Rinaldi, has placed a high priority on restoring the relationship with the Guatemalan Methodist Church and she is having success in these efforts. As a result, weekly devotions with Pastor Sebastian have begun again!

There had been 25 small Spanish hymnals in the clinic previously but they had been misplaced as things were moved around during the almost two years in which they weren't being used. Jan and I tried to find them, more for use by our short and long-term volunteers, as most of the Guatemalan Christians know all the hymns by heart. We

were unsuccessful but Pastor Sebastian kept asking about them.

Last week, I returned only 9 of them to him after finding them on a bottom shelf in the patient pharmacy. This small and gentle man gave me a huge hug and he smiled the biggest smile you ever saw.

We used them again for the first time yesterday and the hymn he chose was Holy, Holy, Holy. The devotions were indeed Holy. May you feel and recognize God moving in your life today and always! 13 cm Art

The six diverse faith communities were "selected because they offer a number of instructive stories about ways in which people of faith are already engaged in conversations about serious health care."

We are honored to have been chosen. We are especially grateful to Pat and Kathy as well as Ann Loth and others who have been involved in this important topic of Advance Care Planning!


